c. General description of width, length and depth of proposed ground disturbing activity:

d. Narrative description of previous land use and past ground disturbances, if known:

Portions of the site were used for underground and strip coal mining in the early 1900s; farming occurred on the Cross Creek floodplain of the southern portion of the site. Both of these activities involved vegetation clearing and minor (grading) or major (excavation) ground disturbance. Beginning in 1958, industrial (ferrochromium alloy ore processing) activities were conducted; these activities ceased by 1984. The ore processing plant site occupied the floodplain, and processing waste ("slag") was deposited in the former coal mine area as well as along the ridge top. Access roads and railroad spurs were constructed. Utilities included electricity and water supply. The site development for industrial purposes largely obliterated evidence of former (mining and agricultural) uses. Based upon aerial photography, approximately 1/3 of the site has been subject to ground disturbance from the industrial activity.

e. Narrative description of current land use and conditions:

The property is not currently used for any productive purpose. Some materials have been salvaged from the ore processing plant, and trespassing all-terrain vehicle riders use the site recreationally. Preliminary site characterization activities, for the purposes of this project, have included surveying, biological evaluation, jurisdictional delineation (for waters of the United States and regulated wetlands), and biological, slag material, and water sample collection and analysis.

The Former Satralloy Site Remediation project will include site characterization and remediation activities. The approximately 325-acre site was used as a ferro-chromium ore processing facility in the mid-1900s. Two large processing buildings (electrofurnace smelters), a water treatment plant, and some appurtenant buildings are the only structures that remain on-site. The slag material from the processing was deposited on the site in abandoned coal strip mine areas that had been excavated in the early 1900s, as well as along on-site ridge tops. Some slag and other waste products (i.e., baghouse dust) are present in the plant site area as well. The project is intended to remove or isolate source material potentially adversely affecting surface water resources (e.g., Cross Creek).

Site characterization activities are expected to begin in 2007, with a remediation plan developed in coordination with the OEPA thereafter. Remediation activities will be conducted once the remediation plan is agreed upon. A schedule for implementation of the remediation plan will be established at that time. At a minimum, the remaining on-site buildings will be demolished and salvaged, and a surface water management plan will be implemented to minimize surface water contact with potentially hazardous materials. Other remediation options under consideration for the waste material may include, but not be limited to, on-site consolidation and capping, excavation and disposal at an off-site facility, or excavation and re-processing at an off-site facility. Some combination of these alternatives may also be considered.

The APE for the project is preliminarily defined as the property boundary, as shown on the attached Figure 1. The APE will be refined once the site characterization activities are complete.

The ore processing activities are not considered historical (e.g., occurred less than 50 years ago) and the remediation project will focus on the portions of the site impacted by the industrial activities. The remediation project will be temporary and not involve the construction of new facilities or change the land use to a more intensive purpose. Visual, auditory, and sociocultural effects would therefore be temporary as well. Accordingly, the remediation project is not expected to permanently affect any nearby historic properties, either directly or indirectly.

A standard Phase I Survey literature review has been conducted to identify any previously recorded historic properties within and immediately adjacent to the project area. Inventories and cultural resources reports were examined at the OHPO to determine previous cultural resources surveys within the area, any NRHP recommendations for previously inventoried cultural resources in the immediate area, and to determine if portions of the current project area impacted or were adjacent to previously recorded, significant cultural resources. OHPO internet mapping, in conjunction with an OAI/OHI records search, was consulted and no previous surveys or sites have been recorded within the project area. County histories were also investigated. The Confederate Cavalry led by John Morgan traveled through the Cross Creek river valley in this area, but no cultural resource remnants associated with this event have been previously identified nor are any expected. Please see Section 2 of the attached Cultural Resources literature review report (Weinberger 2007) for a more detailed discussion of the background research methods and results

A field survey has not been conducted to date. The literature review described above indicates that no buildings, structures, or sites 50 years of age or older are present within the project APE as defined in Section IIj.

A field survey has not been conducted to date. However, background research suggests that the former Satralloy site has been severely disturbed in several locations through previous mining activities and plant-related activities such as removal of topsoil and rock in preparation for depositing slag piles on the property.
